

General Advising Notes

CJS 101 is a pre-requisite for CJS 170, CJS 205, CJS 210, CJS 230, CJS 240

English and Math courses should be taken in your first term, if possible, or first year.

Internships are available for students who complete 30 credits and have a 3.0 GPA

Program electives include any course with a CJS prefix (2 courses must have CJS prefix), Forensic Psychology, Addiction and Substance Abuse, Abnormal Psychology, EMT Basic certification, Firefighter 1 and 2 certification

Core II courses have the following prefixes: ART, HIS, HUM, PHI

Core IV courses have the following prefixes: BIO, CHM, MAT, PHY, SCI

If you plan to work after graduation: Plan to take the ALERT test and the MCJA Phase 1 Pre-Service training program.

If you plan to continue your education: Work closely with your faculty advisor and transfer counselor to make sure your courses transfer smoothly.

• Program Description

The Criminal Justice Associate Degree program focuses on the criminal justice system, its organizational components and processes and its legal and public policy contexts. The program includes instruction in criminal law and policy, law enforcement and correctional organizations, the administration of justice and the judiciary, victim advocacy, and public attitudes regarding criminal justice issues.

• Program Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete the Criminal Justice Associates in Applied Science degree will be able to:

- Identify the functions and roles of all major aspects of the United States criminal justice system.
- Describe the institutions, laws and theories that make up the legal system.
- Explain the constitutional constraints under which police and prosecutors must operate in a free society and the reasoning behind these limitations.
- Discuss the importance and application of basic ethical behavior in the exercise of public trust and discretionary authority.
- Demonstrate effective written, oral and electronic-based communication skills in a professional workplace.

Career Opportunities

The Criminal Justice degree is designed to prepare students for entry level careers in law enforcement, corrections, emergency dispatch, victim advocacy and private security in addition to serving as the basis to transfer on to complete a baccalaureate degree.
